The concentration on moving to the west spared the counties to the east, such as Bastrop County, the issues that follow development of previously undeveloped land. Anyone who has driven west of Austin on Highway 71 or 290 recently has experienced first hand how growth impacts traffic and has witnessed how the landscape has changed. Those of us located east of Austin were grateful,

for the most part, that we had been spared those headaches. It was inevitable that those looking for a peaceful location outside of Austin would finally look east and discover Bastrop County. Statistics reflect that from 1950 to 2000, Texas population grew at a faster rate than Bastrop County population growth. That trend has changed and beginning in 2005, Bastrop County growth has outpaced Texas. This information is not surprising, when see Board page 5

# **ACC Fall Report**

Thank you to all the ACC members that decided to continue to volunteer for the upcoming year and thank you to the new volunteers that have offered to serve this year. We are anticipating a busy year for new home construction and other projects within the Arbors.

Currently there are five homes under construction, one on Sycamore Cove, one on Juniper Trail and three on Arbors Circle. All these homes are in the beginning stages of each project. One additional home is under consideration on Pin Oak Crossing. With this level of construction, it is important that residents keep a watchful eye on the contractors coming and going from the Arbors. Contractors are required by the signed builder's agreement to obey posted road signs for the safety of our children, animals and other drivers. Violations of posted signs, along with other unsafe activity can be enforced. So feel free to report unsafe activity or failure to obey posted signs to the ACC or the Board. In many cases, if notice is provided quickly, the issue can be addressed immediately, while the offending contractor is on the job site. Safety on our roads is paramount and compliance is required.

As fall approaches, leaves will be falling from our trees. Each year when this occurs, items that have been hidden from view in the vards of residents all summer, suddenly become visible. Items that are not appropriate to be visible from the street, such as trailers of all kinds, chain link fences and unscreened utility tanks, will cause a notice to the owner regarding the need to fix the issue. So be aware of what becomes visible on your lot once autumn arrives.

Use of the Arbors roads and compliance with posted speed and stop signs has been a discussion topic by Arbors residents over the past few years. Originally, concern focused on contractors that were speeding and failing to stop as posted while working on the construction of new homes. Based on this concern by residents, the ACC implemented with Board support, the Builders Compliance Agreement which details full enforcement rights and penalties for failure to obey posted road signs. This agreement, signed by the builder and the owner for each project, has been used, in conjunction with visual monitoring, to force compliance with posted signs by contractors.

As our community has grown, the level of concern for how residents and visitors are following the posted road signs has increased. Reports of speeding and failure to stop (especially at the park intersection) have begun to accumulate. In addition to the individual complaints being received, owners voiced in the open forum portion of the September monthly AIA Board meeting their concern regarding failing residents speeding, stop and passing. As part of the discussion, residents provided examples of violations and included suggestions regarding what type of remedies and enforcement might be appropriate. Remedy discussion topics included:

> Painting white lines at each stop sign location to drawn

- attention to the need to stop at the intersection
- Posting a red flashing light along with each stop sign to drawn attention to the required stop as posted
- Renting 'how fast are you driving' signs to be posted in different spots on Arbors roads as a method of reminding drivers of their obligation to obey the posted 30 MPH speed signs
- Posting 'no passing' signs to remind drivers that passing is not allowed
- Creating a system like those utilized in other communities that allows residents to report vehicles violating the posted signs to the management company which would trigger a letter and/or fine system.

The board is continuing to review suggestions received before, during and after the meeting to address these concerns. Owner input (and compliance) is welcome and encouraged. The speed limit for Arbors streets is 30 MPH. Stop signs are posted at most intersections. including a 4-way stop at the park (Arbors Circle and Maple Leaf Trail). This is our community. The value of our community and quality of life associated with it is not just dependant on property values and attractive yards. Everyone has a responsibility to honor the community by following posted road signs and should operate any vehicle in a responsible manner.

The Elgin Police Department usually has a few additional families added to their list after their initial gift delivery and they use this money to purchase additional gifts. statistics reflect that since 2000, the population of Bastrop County has grown 19.5% while population of Elgin has grown 62.9%.

Some of the aches and pains of fast population growth is showing in Elgin. Along with increased business opportunities larger populations bring [like that rumored Walgreens] traffic on Highway 290 and 95 has steadily increased and some local restaurants have a waiting list on Friday nights. But, for the most part, living where we chose to live is a wonderful experience.

The Arbors reflects the growth patterns of Bastrop County and Elgin. Our small community has reached the 55% (143 homes on 261 lots) build out level, with more homes under construction (5) and more homes planned for construction. Homes in the Arbors are considered on the high end of the county tax base, especially considering the median home value for Bastrop County is \$127,254 and for Elgin is \$86,100.

The value we place on our homes in the Arbors is more than what the county says our property is worth and more than a sales price. We value the look of our community, the condition of the private park and roads, the control we have over our community through its volunteers and the fellowship of our neighbors while doing our best to minimize the aches and pains of inevitable growth.

We govern ourselves, we embrace change and we encourage participation. As we

communication becomes grow. increasingly important. Committees often contribute information to the quarterly newsletter to keep you in touch with ongoing activities and community concerns. In addition to the existing volunteer committees operating within the Arbors for several years now (Newsletter, Welcome/Social, and Community Awareness, Maintenance and ACC) a new exploratory building committee is in action. All these committees have a specific purpose and are working for the enjoyment and betterment of the Arbors. For those of you able to attend, communication and information exchange is also a part the regular monthly Board meeting which provides an avenue for owner input and discussion. A draft of the meeting notes are posted on the web site soon after the meeting, so that all owners have access to the information at their fingertips. The newest form of communication available to Arbors owners is the online Forum, which since it was discussed at the annual meeting, has grown in usage both with number of times items are viewed and the number of active contributors. Bottom line is that the Arbors is a great, valued place to live and be a part of a community. The area around us is growing and changing, as is the Arbors itself. We have the structure in place to adjust to and embrace our changing environment and accomplish our goals. We look forward to the upcoming months with great expectations for our community.

#### **Arbors Day Camp Proposed**

The Welcome/Social Committee has begun canvassing the neighborhood with the Fall Fest flyers and talking to you about volunteering to make chili for our cook-off. At that same time they will ask for information which will be used to plan one or several "day camp" days in our park for next summer. The response we get will determine the number of days and the types of programs we will have. This is all still in the planning stages so your input is important to us. If we have numerous children between 3-5 years of age, we'll plan some half-days where the activities and crafts and story time are geared to their age and if parents would like to stay with the littler ones, they would be welcome to do that. Each child would come with a snack and a water bottle. If there are enough older children, we would divide First Grade through Fourth, and Fifth Grade through Seventh, and the craft difficulty level and the activities would be age appropriate. The day for the older children might be from 9-2 with them arriving with a snack, sack lunch and water bottles in a personal cooler.

# National Night Out Bread Pudding Contest Winner Submitted by Anneke Henderson

#### **Bread Pudding:**

1 loaf french bread cut into 1" cubes

1/2 cup raisins (soak 1/2 hour in warm water and drain)

1 pinch nutmeg

1/4 lb butter, melted

1/4 cup sugar

2 teaspoons vanilla

1 qt Half & Half

4 eggs, beaten

#### Method

Fill a 9 x 9 x 2 1/2" baking pan with the bread cubes and sprinkle the raisins on top.

(Use enough bread to come to the top of the pan. You might not use the whole loaf)

Whisk the remaining ingredients together to make a batter, pour over the top of the bread and stir lightly.

Allow the bread to soak 1/2 hour. The pan will be very full. If you have too much batter, discard the excess.

If there's not enough, add a little more milk to the pan.

Bake in a 325° oven for about 40 minutes until the pudding is golden brown and puffed up around the edges.

The center should be "set" but still a little soft.

You can make this ahead of time and heat it in the microwave oven later.

#### Topping: Whiskey Sauce

1/2 lb butter

2 cups sugar

1/4 cup whiskey

4 eggs beaten in a small bowl with the whiskey

#### Method

Melt butter in a small saucepan over low heat. Add sugar and stir. Remove from heat, let cool slightly, then quickly whisk in the beaten eggs and whiskey. Put the sauce back on the stove over low heat and whisk constantly until the sauce has thickened slightly. (If it's overcooked, the sauce will curdle). Keep the sauce warm until serving. If you like, you can serve the bread pudding with a sprinkle of powdered sugar and a scoop of your favorite ice cream.

NOTE: This sauce contains egg yolks, which can carry salmonella bacteria if not fully cooked. As with other foods like beef tartar, Caesar salad, or eggs cooked "sunny side up," caution is advised when eating raw or lightly cooked eggs. I personally don't have much luck with this sauce because I am always overcooking it! You can leave out the eggs and just put the butter, sugar, and whiskey together, but you will have to microwave it before eating to make it liquid.

#### Toppng: Vanilla Sauce

1/2 c. sugar


1/2 c. brown sugar

1/2 c. whipping cream

1/2 c. butter

1 tsp. vanilla

In small saucepan, combine sugar, 1/2 cup brown sugar, whipping cream and 1/2 cup butter. Cook over medium heat until mixture boils, stirring occasionally. Stir in vanilla. Serve warm over pudding
